## Doctoral Preparation in Special Education

Project LEAD is a federally funded project for preparing leaders in supporting students with disabilities in high need schools in gaining access the general curriculum.

Participants are exposed to five competency areas and given experiences and activities for specialization in one of those areas:

- disability law and educational policy,
- improving student outcomes through research and data-based decisions,
- collaborative practices between general and special educators,
- universal design for learning (UDL), and
- service learning

Project LEAD offers students opportunities to:

- a) Collaborate with faculty across the College of Education
- b) Work with high need school districts to design and implement critical research and programs
- c) Engagement with national experts who are conducting research and shaping policy in the field of special education

- Advanced courses and seminars across the five competency areas
- Research promoting access for students with disabilities
- Seminar engaging national experts in the field in discussion of critical topics in special education
- Internships & Traineeship offering collaboration with high need school districts, completion of service-learning projects, assist in grant writing, and teach university courses
- Participation in the preparation of future teachers
